1. Introduction

The legal duty for schools to provide remote education ended in March 2022. Remote education is therefore **not compulsory**, nor is it an alternative to attending school in routine circumstances.

However, St Vincent's will maintain the capacity to provide high-quality remote education **only in specific, limited situations** where a pupil cannot attend school **but is well enough to learn**, or where the school cannot open safely.

Remote education may be used when:

- The Headteacher judges that the school, or part of it, cannot open safely (e.g. severe weather, building issues, public health advice).
- An individual pupil has an exceptional circumstance preventing attendance, is well
 enough to learn, and the absence is expected to last longer than a very short period.

Remote education will **not** be provided for routine illness, minor sickness, or short-term absences where a child is unwell and needs rest.

2. Principles of Remote Education

Our approach reflects the school's commitment to:

- Clear, explicit teaching.
- A knowledge-rich curriculum.
- Strong routines and high expectations.
- Safeguarding and wellbeing.

Remote education will:

- Align with the curriculum taught in school.
- Prioritise core learning in reading, writing and maths.
- Include clear explanations, modelling and independent tasks.
- Be proportionate to the length and nature of the absence.

3. What Will Be Taught Remotely

Where appropriate, pupils will receive daily work that reflects classroom learning as closely as possible. This may include:

- Teacher explanations (written or video-based).
- Structured tasks and independent practice.
- Retrieval practice and consolidation tasks.
- Reading expectations.

For longer periods of remote learning, teachers may use high-quality externally produced content such as Oak National Academy or White Rose Maths to support continuity.

4. How Remote Education Will Be Delivered

St Vincent's uses a simple, accessible set of tools:

- Google Classroom (Juniors) for setting work and receiving submissions.
- Email communication between teachers and parents for all year groups.
- Printed packs where digital access is limited.
- Links to teacher-created or trusted external instructional videos.
- Short virtual check-ins where appropriate for pastoral or instructional support.

All communication will follow school safeguarding expectations.

5. Expectations for Pupils

Pupils who are learning at home (and well enough to do so) are expected to:

- Engage with the work set daily.
- Submit completed work via Google Classroom or email.
- Ask for help if they need it.
- Read every day.

We understand that home circumstances vary, and we will work flexibly with families whenever needed.

6. Expectations for Parents and Carers

Parents are asked to:

- Support routines for learning at home.
- Contact the school promptly if their child is struggling to access the work.
- Ensure work is completed where possible.
- Follow safeguarding guidance for any virtual interaction (appropriate setting, supervision, etc.).

Parents do **not** need to request remote learning when their child is unwell.

7. Support for Pupils and Families

St Vincent's will:

- Provide regular, proportionate feedback to pupils.
- Maintain communication with families to support wellbeing.
- Loan **Chromebooks**, where available, prioritising pupils with limited access or vulnerable groups.
- Provide paper materials if digital access is not possible.
- Make reasonable adjustments for pupils with SEND in line with individual needs.

The SENCO will coordinate specific arrangements for pupils with EHCPs.

8. Safeguarding and Attendance

Safeguarding remains paramount.

- Engagement with remote education will be monitored.
- Concerns will be followed up in line with attendance and safeguarding procedures.
- Staff will follow the school's Child Protection and Online Safety policies at all times.

Remote education does **not** replace marking a pupil as absent when they are not physically in school.

9. Provision for Pupils with SEND

Teachers will adapt remote learning materials where necessary, including:

- Chunked tasks or simplified instructions.
- Scaffolded worksheets.
- Visual prompts or alternative formats.
- Additional contact from support staff.

We will work with families to ensure pupils with SEND can access the work in a manageable and supportive way.

10. Pastoral Support

To support wellbeing during periods of absence, pupils may receive:

- Pastoral phone calls.
- Virtual check-ins.
- Additional contact from the safeguarding team if required.

11. Monitoring and Review

Senior leaders will review the effectiveness of remote education and update this document in line with national guidance.

Review Cycle: Every 3 years or sooner if required.

Next scheduled review: Autumn 2028.
