My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Look outside and see those lovely blossoms that assure us spring is here. We are experiencing new birth, renewal, and great joy.

May sits as a significant month that leans into June. Both of them are usually hectic times for our schools. Nevertheless, many delights May brings to us each year. Firstly, it invites us to celebrate the Queenship of our Mother Mary, who is very dear to her children and us. Through many difficulties when we had lost hope, she has gone to her Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ and said to him: they have no wine, and immediately we receive a litany of favours. She keeps us safe, warping us under her mantle as she comforts us.

May this year has also given us some cause to celebrate as a country when we joined in the coronation of King Charles III. I heard many schools had various events to mark the day.
