September School Hours

I would like to inform you about some important changes to our school schedule starting in September.

Following the recent request from the government for schools to implement a standard weekly teaching time of 32.5 hours, we have carefully reviewed our current timetable to ensure compliance, while maintaining the high standards of education that we strive to deliver. After careful consideration and planning, we have revised our timetable to ensure compliance with the government's directive, while maintaining our commitment to providing the best possible education for your children. Starting in September, we will be adjusting our school hours for all year groups, including Reception.

Effective from the start of the autumn term, our new school hours will be as follows:

Monday to Friday: 8:45 AM to 3:15 PM

With this updated schedule, we will be able to provide the required instructional hours, while still allowing ample time for breaks and lunch, ensuring our students have the opportunity to refresh and recharge throughout the day.

Uniform

As we approach the start of the new academic year in September, I would like to take this opportunity to remind us all of the school uniform rules to ensure a smooth and organised beginning for all students.

Our school uniform policy aims to instill a sense of pride, belonging and equality among our students, fostering a positive learning environment. By adhering to the uniform guidelines, we encourage students to focus on their studies, personal growth, and the values we hold dear.

Please note there are some important changes, particularly with respect to our school bags.

Please find our school uniform policy below.

We kindly request that you ensure your child's uniform complies with our uniform policy from the first day of the new term. Our teachers and staff will be diligently monitoring uniform adherence, and we appreciate your cooperation in maintaining our school's standards.

Thank you for your ongoing support and cooperation in upholding our school's values and ensuring a consistent and positive learning environment for all students.



SCHOOL UNIFORM AND APPEARANCE POLICY

Our School Uniform is important to us. School uniform can play a valuable role by: setting an appropriate tone; instilling pride; supporting positive behaviour and discipline; encouraging identity with, and support for, the school ethos; protecting children from social pressures to dress in a particular way; and nurturing cohesion and promoting good relations between different groups of pupils. We also believe that it supports effective teaching and learning.

Smartness and high standards of appearance are expected at all times. At St Vincent's, we believe that a school uniform is important, because it:

- ♦ looks smart
- ♦ wears well
- ◆ contributes to a sense of belonging
- ♦ gives a common purpose
- ♦ fosters a feeling of pride
- ♦ reduces 'fashion competition' between students.

All students should wear the uniform and we encourage them to maintain an acceptable standard of clean and tidy dress in school.

Our School Uniform, Reception to Year 6

- White, short or long sleeved shirt/blouse
- Grey tailored long trousers (school uniform trousers, not jean style).
- Grey pinafore or skirt.
- Navy V-neck jumper or cardigan (*), no hoods please
- Navy blazer (optional)
- Light blue school tie (*), unless blouse is open neck
- Grey socks for trousers
- White socks for skirts or grey or navy tights
- Black or navy shoes
- Black or navy coat (plain)

Summer variations

- Short grey tailored trousers
- Black or navy sandals (closed toes)
- Plain light blue or white polo shirts
- Blue & white check or stripe dress
- School logoed sunhat, alternatively, plain navy or black sunhat

(*) Navy v-neck jumpers and cardigans with the school logo are available from the school office as well as school ties, school bags and summer hats.

Footwear:

Must be <u>plain black or navy</u> with closed toes and suitable for active play. Boots are only suitable for cold weather and they must be ankle boots. Trainers are only to be worn for games or PE.

Outdoor clothing

Students should bring a coat to school each day. Coats must be plain black or navy, the material of the coat must be without pattern.

P.E.

Plain navy blue or black shorts
Plain white T-shirt
Plain navy blue or black tracksuit
Black plimsolls and/or trainers for outdoor activities

Please note T-shirts in the House colours are not part of our P.E. kit. They should only be worn on Sports Day if children wish.

Fashion Items & Jewellery

For safety reasons, students are not permitted to wear jewellery in school. This includes earrings of any kind. If ears need to be pierced, then please leave this until the start of the 6-week summer holiday.

Fashion accessories such as make-up, nail polish, hair gel, hair extensions, jewellery other than watches, should not be worn.

Long hair should be tied back neatly and off the face, with bands, 'scrunchies' or ribbons where possible in the school colours (navy, white). Extreme hairstyles are not suitable as they draw excessive attention to your child and detract from learning.

Any student arriving at school wearing jewellery will be asked to remove it. The child's parents will be informed. If a child is unable to remove the jewellery without assistance, his/her parents will be called and asked to do so. The school will not accept any responsibility for items of jewellery lost or stolen.

School bags

Students have the option to use our school bags or backpacks, which feature the official St Vincent's logo. Any other school bag should be navy or black and have a plain design, free from logos or brand markings.

We seek to create a level playing field for all students by discouraging the use of very expensive bags. By adhering to affordable and uniform bag guidelines, we promote a sense of belonging and unity among our students, fostering a focus on education rather than status symbols.

This policy aims to promote uniformity and inclusivity, avoiding unnecessary competition based on material possessions. We believe that these guidelines will enhance the learning experience for our students, enabling them to concentrate on their studies and personal growth. Your cooperation in adhering to these policies is greatly appreciated.

Please remember to label every item of uniform with a clear name. This is to avoid items being lost.
