### **Gospel Reflection**

#### Matthew 21:1-11

This Sunday is a special day, called Palm Sunday. We hear how crowds of people welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem shortly before he was crucified. We have palms to remind us of how the people cut branches and laid them in the road before him as they shouted with joy.

We will hear two gospel readings. The second gospel reading is called the Passion and tells the story of how Jesus was arrested, tried, crucified and buried.

In the first gospel reading we hear how Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. The donkey was a very humble animal – not very special for such a special person like Jesus.

All of the people were so happy to see Jesus that they laid their cloaks on the floor and cut branches from palm trees to lay before him to show their respect. This is why this Sunday is called Palm Sunday and why we wave palms. They shouted to show their joy and praise for God.

God made all of us, no matter where in the world that we come from. Jesus is in all of us. So every time we meet someone and we welcome them, we are welcoming Jesus.

Jesus is in all people, so we should treat all people with the respect, love and kindness that we would show to Jesus. We should try to welcome all people into our lives and treat them as we would like to be treated.

This week let us try to welcome all people as we would welcome Jesus.

As we welcome Jesus into our lives, we pray together...
