- Keep children close to the adults who are looking after them.

Did you know sparklers burn 16 times hotter than your kettle? They can cause serious burns!

A School Council is a formal group of pupils within a school who are elected by their peers to represent them and their views.

This is not a popularity contest, but one to select the best-suited children to lead on issues that affect them, thus ensuring that their opinions count. Any child in the school may stand to be a School Council Rep for their class. It is not a decision made by teachers. # **Gospel Reflection**

Luke 20:27-38

Today we hear how a group of religious leaders try to catch Jesus out but he shows them and us a different way of thinking.

In today's story, we hear how the Sadducees asked Jesus a question. The Sadducees were a group of religious leaders who were from rich families, and they did not believe in resurrection - that people would be raised from the dead to be with God in heaven after they had died.

The religious leaders in today's story loved to obey rules. They asked Jesus a question to trap him, to catch him out. They asked him about who a woman would be married to in heaven, if she had been married seven times in her life.

But Jesus says that in heaven everything is different from on earth.

Jesus is showing us that our rules only go so far and that his Kingdom is bigger than this world. If we believe in Jesus we see things differently, we see people differently and we act differently. Because we believe that all people are special and loved by God.

In this gospel story, Jesus is showing us that God sees things differently to us. We believe that in God's Kingdom, everyone is treated equally and fairly, whether they are men, women, girls or boys. However, we know that this does not always happen in our world right now.

Let us think a bit more about treating each other equally. If we all treat each other fairly and as we would like to be treated, perhaps we can start to reflect a little bit of God's Kingdom here on earth.

Prayer:

God of heaven and earth, in this life and the next you are with us. Thank you for protecting us and guiding us as we journey towards you. Amen.
