Dear parents and families,

Traditionally during the month of October, we celebrate Black History Month, a celebration to raise awareness of black history.

We are excited to mark this time at St Vincent's and we see the importance of celebrating this month.

However, we want all pupils to benefit from a high quality and diverse history curriculum. Black History Month only happens once a year; our teaching of black history does not begin and end there.

We feel that one month a year would not be sufficient or appropriate and we supplement this celebration with a curriculum, which has black history running as a thread throughout the year.

It is part of our ethos that pupils should be taught about different societies, and how different groups have contributed to the development of Britain. This includes, of course, the voices and experience of black people.

We study key figures from different cultures, religion and ethnicities as part of a broad and balanced curriculum.

Children are exposed to different artists, scientists, historians, sports personalities and writers, who link to our topics. We also use our literacy lessons and literature in class to provide our children with stories that are "windows" and "mirrors". Windows are those stories about different cultures, whilst mirrors are those stories that reflect children's own culture.

There are many resources that schools and parents can use, to support teaching black history all-year round.

- The <u>Historical Association</u>, has many black history resources available, including those linked to in their annual Black History Month news story.
- <u>BBC Bitesize</u> Resources relevant to Black History Month.
- <u>National Archives</u> 'World Through a Lens', photos from over 100 years history, including Africa and the Americas. Many of these could be used as the stimulus for lessons in black history.
- Oak National Academy Has a selection of black history resources available for both English and history lessons, including information on the resistance to slavery in Jamaica in the 19th century and on the Windrush.
- <u>Bristol Museums</u> and <u>BBC Teach</u> provide resources on the Bristol Bus Boycott.

Above all, we teach our children about the importance of learning to live in a diverse world. We teach them how to respect people's ideas, cultures and religions. Learning about different cultural aspects offers new experiences for children.

Gospel Reflection

Luke 17:11-19

Today we hear about how ten people were healed by Jesus but only one of them said 'thank you'. Let us think about the importance of saying thank you to each other and to God.

We are often reminded how important it is to have good manners. When we ask for something, we should say Please and when we receive something, we should say Thank you.

By saying thank you we show we're happy with what we've got and we recognise how generous the other person has been by giving it to us.

Today we heard that Jesus gave the amazing gift of good health to ten men who all had an illness called leprosy.

While all ten men were happy to receive the gift, only one of them gave thanks to Jesus and praised God.

This illness can be very painful. People with leprosy could not get too close to others for fear of making them sick too. They could not even hug their families or friends anymore. They had to live separately to everyone else.

Though the nine other men were happy to be healed, they did not return to Jesus to give thanks for what he had done. Only one man went back to show how grateful he was for the gift of health and a new life with his family.

Like the man who returned to Jesus, we should try to praise and thank God at all times for the amazing things that we have been given. When we see all that we have as a gift from God, it makes us want to care for the earth and make it a fairer place for all people to live; a place where all people have enough food to eat.

Let us show our thanks to God as we pray together:
